This Cookie Policy explains how Caverley Lightfoot (“we/us”), a firm of solicitors authorised and regulated by the Solicitors Regulation Authority under SRA number 647915, uses cookies and similar technologies on our website www.caverleylightfoot.com

For the purposes of this policy, “cookies” includes cookies and similar technologies such as pixels, tags, scripts, local storage and other tools that store or access information on your device.

This policy should be read alongside our Privacy Notice, which explains how we collect and use personal data.

2. What are cookies?

Cookies are small text files placed on your device when you visit a website. They help websites work properly, remember your preferences, understand how visitors use the site and, in some cases, support marketing or advertising activity.

Some cookies are set directly by us. These are known as “first-party cookies”. Others are set by third parties, such as analytics providers, video platforms, map providers or social media platforms. These are known as “third-party cookies”.

3. How we use cookies

We use cookies to:

- make our website work properly;
- keep the website secure;
- remember your cookie preferences;
- understand how visitors use our website;
- improve our website and services;

- display embedded content, such as maps, videos or social media feeds; and
- where applicable, support marketing or advertising activity.

We will only use non-essential cookies where you have given your consent, unless another legal exemption applies. The ICO's position is that consent must be actively and clearly given, and organisations must explain what cookies do and why they are used. [\[ico.org.uk\]](https://ico.org.uk)

4. Types of cookies we use

Strictly necessary cookies

These cookies are required for our website to function. They may be used for security, network management, accessibility, page navigation, cookie consent management or to enable forms to work.

Because these cookies are essential, they do not require your consent.

Analytics cookies

These cookies help us understand how visitors use our website, for example which pages are visited most often, how long users spend on the site and whether users encounter errors.

We use this information to improve our website and services.

Analytics cookies may require consent, particularly where they are not strictly necessary or where the data is used for wider tracking or profiling. The ICO states that organisations must obtain consent for cookies unless an exemption applies, and the same rules apply to similar technologies. [\[ico.org.uk\]](https://ico.org.uk)

Functionality cookies

These cookies allow the website to remember choices you make, such as language settings, accessibility preferences or display preferences.

Some functionality cookies may be essential to provide a service you request, while others may require consent depending on their purpose.

Marketing and advertising cookies

These cookies may be used to build a profile of your interests, show you relevant adverts on other websites or measure the effectiveness of advertising campaigns.

We will only use marketing or advertising cookies if you give your consent.

Third-party and embedded content cookies

Our website may include third-party content, such as:

- Google Maps;
- YouTube or Vimeo videos;
- social media plug-ins;
- online review widgets;
- live chat tools; or
- legal directory badges.

These third parties may set their own cookies when you interact with their content. We do not control all third-party cookies, so you should also check the relevant third party's cookie or privacy policy.

5. Consent and managing your cookie choices

When you first visit our website, you will be asked to choose whether to accept or reject non-essential cookies.

You can change your cookie preferences at any time by:

- clicking "Cookie Settings" on our website;
- using the cookie banner or preference centre; or
- changing your browser settings.

You can also block or delete cookies through your browser. However, if you block all cookies, some parts of our website may not work properly.

6. Browser controls

Most web browsers allow you to manage cookies through the browser settings. You can usually:

- view the cookies stored on your device;
- delete cookies;
- block all cookies;
- block third-party cookies; or
- set preferences for particular websites.

For more information, you can visit your browser provider's support pages.

7. Personal data and cookies

Some cookies may collect information that identifies you directly or indirectly, such as an IP address, device identifier or browsing behaviour.

Where cookies involve the processing of personal data, we will process that data in accordance with our Privacy Notice and applicable data protection law.

Depending on the cookie and its purpose, the lawful basis for processing personal data may include:

- your consent;
- our legitimate interests in maintaining and improving our website; or
- compliance with a legal obligation.

Where consent is required for the use of cookies, we will ask for your consent before placing those cookies on your device.

8. How long cookies last

Cookies may be:

- “session cookies”, which are deleted when you close your browser; or
- “persistent cookies”, which remain on your device for a set period unless you delete them earlier.

9. Changes to this Cookie Policy

We may update this Cookie Policy from time to time to reflect changes in our website, the cookies we use, legal requirements or regulatory guidance.

The latest version will always be available on our website. We recommend that you review this policy periodically.
